Switching It Up with ALTUVIIIO™

ALTUVIIIO is a Factor VIII replacement therapy for hemophilia A.

Planning to talk with your doctor about switching to ALTUVIIIO for once-weekly prophylaxis, on-demand, or perioperative treatment?

5 key questions to ask your doctor about ALTUVIIIO:

- 1. Can we talk about ALTUVIIIO? I'd like to discuss why I think it may be right for me.
- **2.** How can ALTUVIIIO help keep my Factor VIII levels in the near-normal to normal range for longer?
- 3. How does ALTUVIIIO work to protect me from bleeds and joint bleeds?
- **4.** Do you think that ALTUVIIIO could be the right treatment for me for bleed protection?
- **5.** What kind of side effects have patients on ALTUVIIIO experienced?

4 helpful questions to ask your doctor about switching to prophylaxis:

- **1.** I'm considering prophylaxis instead of on-demand treatment. What are the potential benefits of making a change to a prophylaxis regimen?
- 2. How often will I take ALTUVIIIO as prophylaxis?
- **3.** Can I also take ALTUVIIIO on demand for breakthrough bleeds? Would the dosing be different from prophylaxis?
- **4.** What do I need to do to start a prophylaxis regimen?

The recommended prophylaxis regimen is 50 IU/kg every 7 days as directed by your doctor. In children under 6 years of age, the recommended regimen is 50 IU/kg administered once weekly.

INDICATION

ALTUVIIIO™ [antihemophilic factor (recombinant), Fc-VWF-XTEN fusion protein-ehtl] is an injectable medicine that is used to control and reduce the number of bleeding episodes in people with hemophilia A (congenital Factor VIII deficiency).

Your healthcare provider may give you ALTUVIIIO when you have surgery.

Who should not use ALTUVIIIO?

You should not use ALTUVIIIO if you have had an allergic reaction to it in the past.

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IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information I need to know about ALTUVIIIO?

Do not attempt to give yourself an injection unless you have been taught how by your healthcare provider or hemophilia center. You must carefully follow your healthcare provider's instructions regarding the dose and schedule for injecting ALTUVIIIO so that your treatment will work best for you.

Who should not use ALTUVIIIO?

You should not use ALTUVIIIO if you have had an allergic reaction to it in the past.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before using ALTUVIIIO?

Tell your healthcare provider if you have had any medical problems, take any medications, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, supplements, or herbal medicines, are breastfeeding, or are pregnant or planning to become pregnant.

What are the possible side effects of ALTUVIIIO?

You can have an allergic reaction to ALTUVIIIO. Call your healthcare provider or emergency department right away if you have any of the following symptoms: difficulty breathing, chest tightness, swelling of the face, rash, or hives.

Your body can also make antibodies called "inhibitors" against ALTUVIIIO. This can stop ALTUVIIIO from working properly. Your healthcare provider may give you blood tests to check for inhibitors.

The common side effects of ALTUVIIIO are headache, joint pain, and back pain.

These are not the only possible side effects of ALTUVIIIO. Tell your healthcare provider about any side effect that bothers you or does not go away.
